

Vancouver-based artist Kasper Feyrer presents a series of new works that connect creative research in mycology to understandings of care, more-than-human relations, and queer intimacies through visibility and embodiment. Feyrer's long-standing material engagement in filmmaking uses the camera as an extension of the human sensorium, as a "device through which one can feel time and mirror perception, expanding one's embodied experience of the world."

The environment of works in *Turn Toward* uphold powerful queer ideas of ecology, which inherently demonstrate qualities of lived sensitivity towards more relational ways of being. *Turn Toward* debuts the film *O'on* (2022), a haunting mythology of transformation. "O'on" is the phonetic root form of the word "egg" — suggesting a cosmic interrogation of self-concepts and emergent identities through metaphors of queerness, birth, growth, sexuality and embodiment, death, and loss.

Alongside the film, Feyrer has produced sculptural works made of the mycelium from Artist's Conk (*Ganoderma applanatum*), a decomposer-fungi which plays an important role in the cycling of nutrients through forest ecologies. The sculptures were composed and cultivated in Feyrer's studio, which doubles as a mushroom cultivation lab.

In a further series of works, the practical tools of mushroom cultivation — such as liquid cultures, petri dishes, and chemistry glass — are reformed into imaginary objects, inspiring the scenographic backdrop for a future iterative film work. A series of cyclical hourglass wheels are additionally presented, made in collaboration with SFU Chemistry glassblower Lucas Clarke. Each hand-blown glass wheel is a self-contained time-keeping device: keeping time instead of telling it.

Feyrer shares knowledge learned from their ongoing collaboration with fungi, realized through a network of artworks within an impermanent, living timeline: disrupting the dualities of subject and object through de-centering human ontologies. By extending affirmative and regenerative symbolism toward transgender allegories, *Turn Toward* poetically transcribes a cultural understanding of the aliveness and associative resonances of fungi as collaborators.

An artist book connected to the exhibition will be co-produced and distributed by SFU Galleries and Publication Studio 66B. Research and production assistance towards the exhibition was gratefully provided to the artist by SFU Biologist Dr. Zamir Punja and SFU Chemistry glass artisan Lucas Clarke.

Kasper Feyrer was born in ləkwəŋən Territory, and now lives and works on the unceded territories of the səlilwətał, Skwxwú7mesh and xwməθkwəyəm. They root their practice in an embodied engagement with celluloid filmmaking and sculpture, with emphasis on the body's relationship to these media. They conceive of the camera as a bodily extension of the human sensorium — a device through which one can feel time and perception, and thereby aid or alter one's experience of the world. Feyrer has an interest in queer ecologies which relates to this experimentation in aiding and altering perception.

In their approach to sculpture, they use material-based research to explore notions of the imaginal and unstable questions of ontology. Incorporating a wildly poetic mess of materials and objects into sculptural props and film set installations—from hair and fused glass to mirrors, coins, and herbal remedies. Feyrer often links their film to their sculptures, by employing "practical film effects": physical objects and non-digital special effects made for the verisimilitude of the camera.

Feyrer graduated with a Meisterschülerin from the Städelschule in Frankfurt, Germany in 2010, and received a Bachelor of Media Arts, Emily Carr Institute of Art + Design in 2004. They have held solo exhibitions at Dazibao, Montreal (2019); Catriona Jeffries, Vancouver (2018); POTTS, Los Angeles (2017); Western Front, Vancouver (2014); Catriona Jeffries, Vancouver (2012); and Artspeak, Vancouver (2010). Their work has been included in group exhibitions at the Vancouver Art Gallery (2017, 2016); the Art Gallery of Alberta, Edmonton (2013); and Presentation House Gallery, North Vancouver

(2012). In collaboration with artist Tamara Henderson, Feyrer has presented exhibitions at Bonniers Konsthall, Stockholm (2016); Morris and Helen Belkin Art Gallery, Vancouver (2016); Institute of Contemporary Art Philadelphia (2015); and Walter Phillips Gallery, Banff (2013).

With the hands of an artist, eyes of an ecologist, and the heart of a deeply connected human, Willoughby Arevalo brings the practical and the joyful together through the science and wonder of mycology, interdisciplinary visual and performing arts, and education. In his lifelong relationship with fungi, he has spent over a decade sharing mycology in his home communities and across North America. Together with his life partner and collaborator, Isabelle Kirouac, he facilitates the Art & Fungi Project, which offers collaborative artistic workshops and residencies in schools, community centers, art spaces and parks around Western Canada and beyond. These experiences invite community participants to not only learn from fungi, but to grow their true earthly relationships. He is the author of DIY Mushroom Cultivation: Growing Mushrooms at Home for Food, Medicine, and Soil (2019), a book that decomposes barriers to small scale mushroom growing. Raised by parents of Jewish, Peruvian, and Western European ancestry in Arcata, California, on Wiyot and Yurok Territories, he lives and strives to be a good guest on Coast Salish Territory

in Vancouver, BC, and wherever he goes. When not hanging out in the forest with his mushroom friends, he can be found cooking up magic in his kitchen, playing out imaginary scenarios with his kid, drumming in the neighbourhood brass band, or weaving giant sculptures out of living willow.
