

## POST BACCALAUREATE DIPLOMA PROGRAMME

The Post Baccalaureate Diploma in Criminology is available through on-campus course offerings, distance education (correspondence) format, or a combination of the two modes. It is open to those persons who have previously completed a Bachelor's or higher degree in any field except Criminology. It will be of special interest to those who wish to fulfil or change career goals, to professionals who seek mid-career advancement through upgrading and expanding their knowledge of criminology, and to those who wish to develop their general education background. Students must make separate application for admission to Simon Fraser University in accordance with Simon Fraser University procedures and deadlines for the appropriate semester.

Diploma requirements at Simon Fraser University include an undergraduate degree and thirty semester hours of upper division courses, of which at least fifteen must be in criminology. In addition, three lower division prerequisites are required: CRIM 101-3\* (Introduction to Criminology) plus CRIM 131-3 (Introduction to the Criminal Justice System--A Total Approach), and CRIM 135-3 (Introduction to Canadian Law & Legal Institutions: A Criminal Justice Perspective).

At least five of the Criminology upper division courses listed below are required for the Post Baccalaureate Diploma Programme in Criminology. The remaining courses required (15 credits) for the Diploma may be filled by additional upper level Criminology courses or with upper level courses from any other discipline, subject to approval.

**Prospective Post Baccalaureate Diploma students must submit their planned study programme to the School of Criminology for approval.**
