

Dr. Michelle La Flamme was born in Coast Salish territory and is of Creek, African-American and Metis descent. She is an educator, performer and social justice advocate. Michelle completed a Ph.D. at UBC in English literature (May 2006) and was awarded the department prize for her dissertation. Her doctoral dissertation “Living, Writing and Staging Racial Hybridity” is being published by Wilfred Laurier University Press in 2010. She has been an educator for two decades and has had the good fortune of taking her ideas abroad as a guest lecturer in Germany, Spain and The Netherlands. Michelle is often asked to speak or perform at Canadian conferences addressing representations of race in contemporary Canadian art and literature. Currently, she is a Program Director in the Centre for Aboriginal Programs and Services in the Community and Social Justice Division at the Justice Institute of BC. In this role she is able to fuse her interest in education and her political insight into social justice issues in order to make change.
