

Tamari Kitossa teaches courses in the areas of the criminal legal system and the sociology of law, punishment, and society. He earned his BA from York University, MA from York University's Faculty of Education, and his Ph.D from the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto. Dr. Kitossa has published on issues of racial profiling, the environment, and racism. Dr. Kitossa's dissertation examined the intersection of the social construction of crime, law breaking, media, and anti-African racism in western culture and Canadian society. Dr. Kitossa volunteers as a mentor for youth inmates. In addition to continued examination of racial profiling in criminological literature and developing an African-centered approach to criminology, his research interests are African-Canadian police officers and police ethno-racial organizations, and young African Canadian ex-narcotics traffickers. With Dr. Katerina Deliovsky, he is currently researching the perceptions and experiences of interracial couples with regard to racial profiling.
