Frank Cunningham, Emeritus Professor of Philosophy and Political Science, University of Toronto. Formerly President of the Canadian Philosophical Association, Chair of the University of Toronto's Philosophy Department, Principal of its Innis College, and Interim Director of its Centre for Ethics. Adjunct Professor of Urban Studies at Simon Fraser University. In addition to being a well-known and prolific academic, he was also a political activist on issues related to social justice and democratic socialism. Frank Cunningham died on February 4, 2022, having decided to have medical assistance in dying (MAID).

Duane Fontaine is a professional accountant who recently earned his PhD in interdisciplinary studies where he examined the future of work through the lens of Critical Theory. In his thesis, Duane critically applied the conceptual tools of Theodor Adorno's constellation and negative dialectics to the analysis of the policy alternatives currently debated in many of the future of work narratives. Current policies, such as basic income, reduced work weeks, and worker cooperatives were analyzed and contrasted to the utopian horizon of the future of work provided by early Frankfurt School thinkers, the German Idealists, and Karl Marx.

Ed Graham is a PhD candidate at Simon Fraser University. His research centres on Critical Theory and Contemporary Film, and his dissertation explores the aesthetic and political significance of intoxication and addiction as registrations of crisis-ridden capitalism in the twenty-first century.

He has held professorships at the China Academy of Art, Hangzhou, the Karlsruhe University of Arts and Design.
