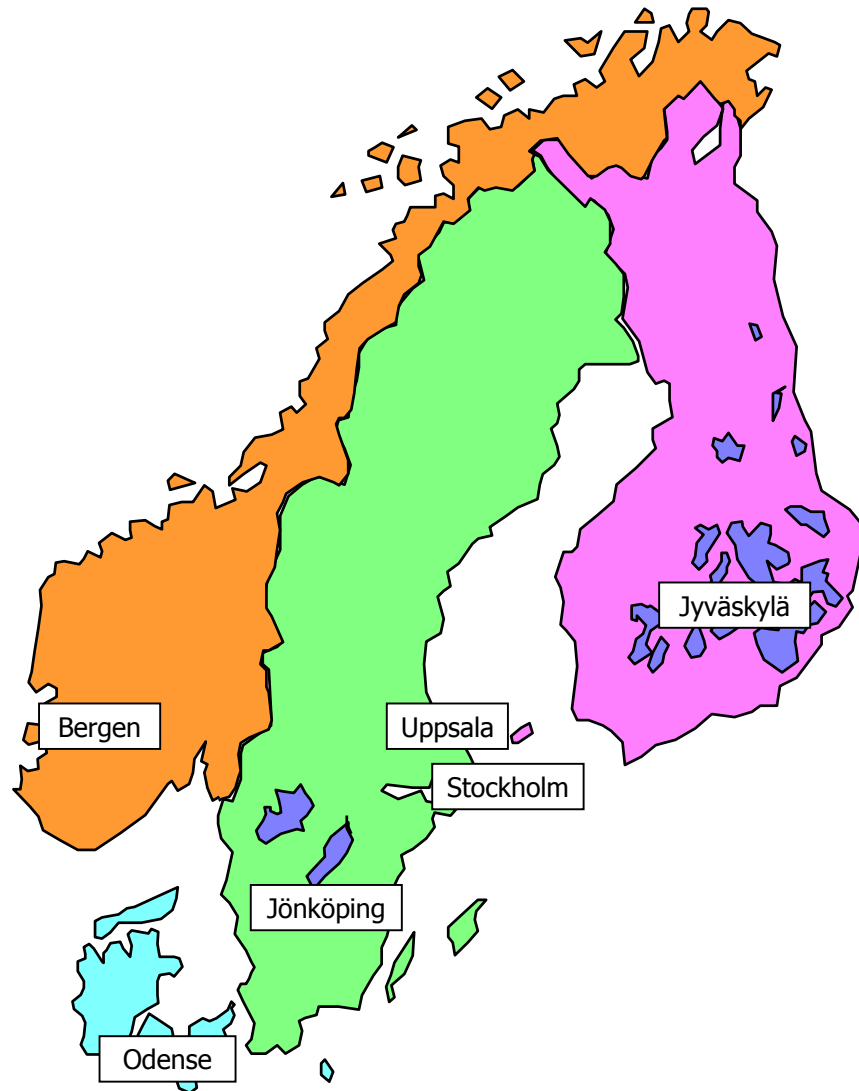
NORDPLUS
