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



- Q. Who does the course?
- A. It was designed for a wide range of health and social care professionals.

To date the students have mainly been nurses.

Q. Has the course been a success?

A. Yes (in my view)

- When we ran the course in the evenings the numbers were in the region of 18-25 in Year 1.
- A Trust then paid us to run the course in the daytime. The numbers are now much smaller, but we make much more money!

- Trust managers say they see a real difference in students after our course

Masters Programmes at King's College London

- Started in 1988, with first graduates in 1990
- 250 graduates to date (15 MSc Clinical Gerontology, 6 PG Diploma, 227 MSc Gerontology)

• Students come from overseas as well as UK, but mostly the latter

Masters Programmes at KCL are:

- Multi-disciplinary
- •Competitive entry
- •Demand fluctuates but enquiries always buoyant
- •Applicants mainly from health-related areas

•Evidence that degree is beneficial to career advancement and ability to perform job **Masters Courses in Gerontology in UK**

•Only few in existence

•Mostly very vulnerable, due to: funding difficulties employer support often low difficulties in supply of teaching staff
