Approaches to Curbing the Illegal Market in Organs

- Decrease Illegitimate Supply
 - Legislation and Criminal Law Enforcement

- Increase Legitimate Supply
 - Nation-State self-sufficiency (National Altruism)
 - Re-Direct supply from live to dead
