**Although Greek vowels are fewer in number than English ones there are more than one ways to write each vowel. This makes Greek spelling tricky.

The Accent. The Greek accent lets us know which syllable to stress. For the most part words that have one syllable do not receive an accent. The accent is a crucial part of Greek spelling and must not be omitted, or placed incorrectly. The accent can only be placed over a vowel letter, and if the vowel is represented by two letters on the second letter in the combination. Capital letters are only accentuated at the beginning of a word, never if something is written in 'all-caps.'
