Each year the InspiraTO Festival produces ten-minute plays based on a theme on one of the senses. This year's theme is on vision/sight. Sight is considered the most complex of the five senses. It is the sense that gives us the most information.

For the **2012 Festival** there were **311** submissions from Canada and around the world. We were so impressed with the caliber of plays that we decided to have a series of 4 shows; each with their own unique perspective. The redEye show: Visions with passion - plays that deal with our deep longings, and push our idea of obsession and desire. The yellowEye show: Visions that alert - plays that challenge the status quo, re-examine the way we live, and challenge our world view. The blueEye show: Visions with mystery - plays that make you think, and don't give you black and white answers. The whiteEye show: New voices - showcasing plays from InspiraTO's Playwrights' Mentoring Project (emerging Canadian playwrights). InspiraTO 2012 also features a series of after-show Talkbacks for all four series (June 6, 7 & 8 shows). Each "Eye" show has 6 ten-minute plays with no intermission and quick set changes between plays: Because each InspiraTO show is 60 minutes, you can easily see two or three shows back-to-back - like Fringing, but for ten-minute plays:

blueEye Show: 6 ten-minute plays in one show (performed in the following order):

Bryan Boodhoo's **The Common Ground** opens this show with an exploration of art and life. Three pre-teen girls in Anne Flanagan's **Camping Out**, are anxious about their budding sexuality. In Peter Dickinson's **Positive I.D.**, a victim is unsure of what - or who - she's seen. In **Beyond Where the Horizon Lies** by Rod McFadden, two characters spend time looking for something, though they have no idea what that something is. Nelson Yu's absurd **All Your Bosses Are Belong to Chinese** spins racial dominance on its head. A traffic light changes and a young man is warned not to step off the curb in Stanley Toledo's **Standing at the Edge of the Universe of Disunity.**

Once the plays are on stage, *your* opinions become a key element of the InspiraTO Festival – audiences vote for their favourite plays and the top two from each colour group are showcased at the final Sunday matinee performance (June 10). Fill out the ballot at the end of the show and drop it off in the ballot box in the lobby. **You must select exactly two plays for you vote to be valid.**

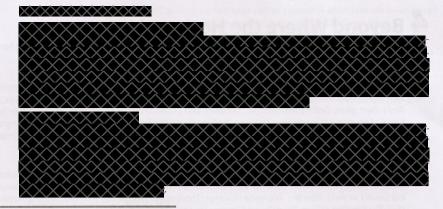
We also have the Ten Day Playwriting Contest, an opportunity to write a ten-minute play over the ten days of the Festival. The winning playwright will receive a \$250 prize plus a staged reading of their work during the final performance on June 10 (contest opens on May 24, closes June 2 – visit www.inspiratofestival.ca for details).

Don't be fooled into thinking that because it's short it's overly simplistic. Shorter in some cases makes things more interesting. A quality ten-minute play demands more crafting, selectivity and there's no time to waste on extraneous subplots; you're thrown into the fire straight away. Every minute counts.
