p. 109 ECON 201-3

Change of Description

From: "An introduction to the problems of the B.C. economy."

To: "A study of the development and structure of the British Columbia economy and its external relationships. Emphasis will be given to the importance of labour and natural resources in the regional economy, and to public policy issues."

Change of Prerequisite

OMIT: Students with credit for ECON 365 cannot take this course for further credit.

RATIONALE: To conform more closely to, and to more precisely describe the actual content of the course. When this course was first developed it was envisaged that it would cover the same material as ECON 365-3. However, this has not been the case and the department wishes to remove this restriction.

NOTE: COMM 477-3 and 478-3 already have prerequisites of 90 credit hours and 105 credit hours respectively.

RATIONALE: This is an editorial change. The department has found that students have overlooked the following statement on page 107 of the 1977-78 Calendar.

"Normally, students will not be permitted to take the Department's Upper Division courses (course numbered 300 and 400) during their first 60 hours without permission of the Chairman of the Undergraduate Program in Economics and Commerce." It wishes to list this requirement under each individual course, in addition to this statement.

p. 114 COMM 222-3

Change of Prerequisites:

From: "COMM 221-3 must precede or be taken concurrently."

To: "Comm 221-3."

RATIONALE: Experience with students who have taken COMM 221-3 and COMM 222-3 simultaneously has been unfavourable. It is logical that the concepts course precede the procedures course. Problems occur when students drop or fail COMM 221-3 and complete COMM 222-3.

p. 115 COMM 321-3

Change of Prerequisites

From: "COMM 320-3 or permission of the Department."

To: "COMM 320-3. 60 credit hours."

RATIONALE: Experience with students who have taken COMM 320-3 and COMM 321-3 simultaneously has been unfavourable, as COMM 321-3 builds on work of COMM 320-3. There are problems when students drop or fail COMM 320-3 and complete 321-3.

Change of Prerequisites

ADD: "COMM 270-3. 60 credit hours."

RATIONALE: Comm 387 (like Comm 371-Organization Theory, for which Comm 270 is already a prerequisite) requires a familiarity with basic behavioral concepts, research findings, and normative approaches regarding such topics as motivation, group relationships, and decision formulation and implementation. A common core of such information is provided by COMM 270.
