At the meeting held on September 7, 1979, the Latin American Studies Steering Committee recommended:

- (1) That Geography 343-3, "Geography of Transitional Societies"; and Spanish 340-3, "Hispanic Literature in Translation" be added to the list of Courses with Partial Latin American Content (pages 356, 357)
- (2) That the requirements for the Upper Division courses be changed from: (pages 353, 353)

"A minimum of 14 credit hours including at least one, but not more than two, of LAS. 402-5, 403-5, or 404-5. The remaining courses must be taken in at least two departments other than that of the major, if any."

to:

"A minimum of 14 credit hours including at least one, but not more than two, of LAS. 402-5, 403-5, or 404-5. If only one Latin American Studies 400 division seminar is selected, the remaining courses must be taken in at least two departments other than the major, if any. If two Latin American Studies seminars are selected, the remaining course must be taken in at least one department other than the major, if any."

- (3) That an asterisk be placed before Geography 263-3, "Selected Regions", in order to note that it is full Latin American Studies content only when the selected region is Latin American. (page 356)

2. Joint Major Disciplines (from 20 to 30 hours, as indicated for the specific discipline)

ARC-LAS. 20 credits in Archaeology at the 300 and 400 division.
GEOG-LAS. 20 credits in Geography from specified upper division courses, including: five courses (15 hours) from Division A; two courses (10 hours) from Division B; (5 hours), which course cannot be used for GEOG 467-5 LAS. requirements.

HIST-LAS. 30 credits in upper division History, as required for History majors.

POL-LAS. 30 credits in upper division Political Science, as required for Political Science majors. POL. 337-3 and POL. 338-3 cannot be used to satisfy LAS. requirements.

S.A.-LAS. 20 credits in upper division Sociology and Anthropology.

SPAN-LAS. 20 credits in upper division Spanish. Only one of SPAN 341-3 or SPAN 451-5 can be used for this requirement.

The Minor in Latin American Studies

Course Requirements

Lower Division Courses

A total of 9 credit hours including LAS. 200-3; the remaining courses are to be taken from the approved list of Latin American content courses in at least two departments other than that of the major, if any.

Upper Division Courses

A minimum of 14 credit hours including at least one, but not more than two, of LAS. 402-5, 403-5, or 404-5. The remaining courses must be taken in at least two departments other than that of the major, if any.

Language Preparation

Although all courses are taught in English, students will be required to demonstrate a reading knowledge of Spanish or Portuguese or, in exceptional circumstances, French. This ability is seen as a recommended skill for upper division course work, which is taught in seminar format and which frequently involves independent investigation of a specialized topic by participants.

Spanish: Competence in Spanish may be demonstrated by the completion of a recommended series (A or B) in the Department of Languages, Literatures and Linguistics, by passing a language examination administered by the Spanish Division, Department of Languages, Literatures and Linguistics.

Series A SPAN 102, 103 (spoken Spanish series)
Series B SPAN 110, 111 (reading Spanish series)

Portuguese: Competence in Portuguese will be demonstrated by passing a language examination administered by the Spanish Division, Department of Languages, Literatures and Linguistics.

French: French may be used in exceptional cases with the approval of the Steering Committee. Competence may be demonstrated by completion of a recommended series (A or B) in the Department of Languages, Literatures and Linguistics or by passing a language examination administered by the French Division, Department of Languages, Literatures and Linguistics.

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

1. LATIN AMERICAN STUDIES COURSES (LAS.)

LAS. 200-3 Introduction to Latin American Studies

A lecture course taught co-operatively, and organized in three "modules": "Man and the Land", "The Human Condition in Latin America", and "The Political Alternatives", each of which will be considered from the varying perspectives of politics, history, geography, literature, etc. Designed for students with little or no background as a broad first look at Latin American culture.

(Lecture/Tutorial)

Students who have received credit for LAS. 100-3 may not take this course for further credit.

LAS. 402-5 Interdisciplinary Seminar in Selected Latin American Subjects. (Seminar)

LAS. 403-5 Interdisciplinary Seminar in Selected Latin American Subjects (Seminar)

LAS. 404-5 Interdisciplinary Seminar in Selected Latin American Subjects (Seminar)

The above interdisciplinary upper division seminars are taught co-operatively by Latin American Studies associated faculty. Each semester a topic will be chosen which can be examined profitably from the perspectives of several disciplines. Examples are: Militarism, Indigenism, The Political Novel, Race and Ethnic Conflict in the Caribbean, etc.

Prerequisite: LAS. 200-3 recommended.

2. COURSES WITH EXCLUSIVE LATIN AMERICAN CONTENT

Students are advised to consult the Calendar or the Departments concerned with regard to prerequisites for the courses listed and their descriptions. Because departments offer courses which are taught by a number of faculty with different professional interests, it should be noted that credit will be given for particular courses *only when they are taught by the named faculty associated with the program*. Students wishing to take a special topics course for credit towards a minor in Latin American Studies should have the course approved by the Co-ordinator.
