Acting under its delegated authority at its meeting of March 10, 1981, the Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies approved that in the requirements (optional) for the B.C. Studies Certificate Program, the course HIST 432-3 - The Canadian West, be replaced by HIST 436-3 - British Columbia.

The earlier course has been divided into two parts and the section related to B.C. is the one to be retained in the options of this program.

The course History 432-3, "The Canadian West", which is an optional course in the B.C. Studies Certificate Program, has been made into two courses: History 435-3, "The Canadian Prairies" and History 436-3, "British Columbia". The chairman of the B.C. Studies Certificate Program Steering Committee, Robin Fisher, has advised me that due to these changes History 432-3 should be deleted from the program and History 436-3 put in its place.

This change represents no change in either the spirit or substance of the Certificate program and I trust the Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies will approve the substitution.

- (ii) A maximum of 12 credit hours completed after reaching age 60 or over but prior to formal enrolment in this Certificate Program may be applied toward the Certificate requirements.
- (iii) All courses used toward the Certificate normally must be taken through SFU and not more than 6 semester hours of approved transfer credit for other university/college work may be applied toward the Certificate requirements.
- (iv) Program requirements normally must be completed within five years of admission.

12.2 CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN BRITISH COLUMBIA STUDIES

The Program provides adults with an opportunity to complete, on a part-time basis and in association with students with similar interests, a sequential and coherent program in a liberal arts field. Selected resources of Simon Fraser University and the Vancouver Museums are combined in a study of British Columbia's cultural and physical development.

The Program is advised by a Steering Committee. Recommendations for the award of the Certificate will be made through this Committee.

Admission

Admission to the Program is governed by the regulations pertaining to admission to SFU. (See Admission, Section 2 of this Calendar.)

Program Requirements

- (1) The successful completion of at least 30 credit hours, with 20 of those 30 hours earned by completing ARC 101-3 and 223-3, GEOG 263-3, HIST 202-3, S.A. 140-4 (Introduction to the Ethnography of British Columbia), and S.A. 486-4; and with the remaining 10 or more hours selected from:

ARC 273-3, 301-2, 360-5, 372-5, 433-5, 476-5
CNS 200-3
GEOG 262-3
HIST 424-5, 428-5, 432-3
S.A. 386-4, 490-4

When the following courses are given with appropriate content, they will be included among the optional courses:

ENGL 360-4
HIST 484-5
S.A. 396-4

- (2) Participation in field study, either through completing ARC 433-5, GEOG 498-5, or through a credit-free offering.
- (3) Participation in the credit-free components of the Program, such as an Introductory Session (to provide the conceptual framework) and the semesterly sessions (to provide integration of Program studies).
- (4) Program requirements normally must be completed within 5 years of admission.

Notes:

- i) Credits applied toward this Certificate may not be applied toward any other Simon Fraser University certificate or diploma, but may also be applied toward Major program or Minor program requirements or toward a Bachelor's degree under the normal regulations governing those programs.
- ii) Credit for a maximum of two courses (totalling not more than 10 credit hours) of comparable content and level may be transferred from other approved university/college study toward the requirements of this Program.
- iii) Academic advising may be obtained from the Academic Advice Centre (see Section 4. of this Calendar) or from the Program Steering Committee.

12.3 CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN HEALTH AND FITNESS STUDIES

The Program provides adults with the opportunity to complete on a part-time basis a co-ordinated and coherent program of university study in the areas of health, physical fitness, and nutrition. The Program is intended to provide basic familiarity with the functioning of the healthy human body at rest and during physical exertion.

In addition to its direction toward the general public, the Program will also be useful to those supervising, training or reconditioning programs at YM/YWCA's, health spas, etc., or to uncertified sports coaches. An opportunity will be offered during the Program to become certified in cardio-pulmonary resuscitation.
