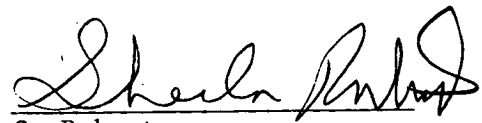

The Psychology Department recommends the following calender changes:

Changes in prerequisites:

1. Psychology 385-3, Animal Behaviour
From: Prerequisite: PSYC 101; Recommended: BISC 101 and 102
To: Prerequisite: PSYC 101
Reason: This change will bring Psych 385-3 into line with most of our other 300 level courses. The material in these biology courses is not needed for an understanding of the current content of Psych 385-3.
2. Psychology 402-5, Seminar in the History of Psychology
From: Prerequisite: PSYC 101, 201, and 207
To: Prerequisite: PSYC 101, 201, 207, and 90 hours of credits or permission of the department
Reason: This change is necessary because the course is required for Honours students and often they are unable to enroll in the course because of enrollment pressures. By adding the prerequisite of 90 credit hours Honors students will be able to take it at an appropriate time in their program. This change also makes the prerequisites for 402 consistent with the other fourth year seminars in the department.

Changes in the Honors Program Description:

1. On p. 104 under the section Directed Studies Courses the final paragraph be changed
From: Directed Studies courses may not duplicate material covered in other Psychology courses. An honors project may not be initiated in a Directed Studies course.
To: Directed Studies courses may not duplicate material covered in other Psychology courses.
Reason: The word "initiated" is somewhat ambiguous. It is better for honors students to have done some thinking and reading about their honors project before entering PSYC 490 than to come in cold to the course, although it would be inappropriate for them to have begun data collection. Rather than actively encouraging or prohibiting "initiation", we should stay silent on the issue.
2. On p. 104 a) delete the section entitled Honors Project and b) change point number 4 under "Completion"
From: 4) Successfully complete an honors project (PSYC 490-5 and PSYC 499-5)
To: 4) Successfully complete an honors project (PSYC 490-5 and PSYC 499-5). Students must have completed at least 90 semester-hour credits of university work, with at least 20 credits in

upper division Psychology courses before enrolling in the honors project. A plan must be approved by the faculty supervisor and by the Psychology 490 Instructor before work is begun.

Reason: Many students fail to distinguish between enrolling in the honors program and enrolling in the honors project (PSYC 490/499). This distinction makes little difference except in the required hours for eligibility. Students must have completed 60 hours before applying for the honors program but 90 hours (including 20 upper level psychology credits) before enrolling in PSYC 490. Moving the description of the credit hour prerequisites for PSYC 490 into the section describing the honors project requirement clarifies this issue.

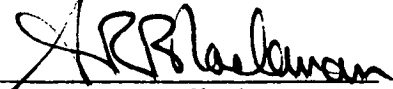
