French 306-3 Introduction to French Linguistics

**Argument:**

Permits student to complete subsequent 9 upper division hours in either French linguistics or literature or both if he/she so desires.

**FREN 301-3 Advanced French-Composition I**

Emphasis is placed on written command of French. Detailed study of syntax.

(Lecture/tutorial)

*Prerequisite: FREN 202 or permission of the Course Chair. Students with limited experience in writing compositions in French are advised to take FREN 206 before undertaking FREN 301.*

Change to:

**FREN 301-3 - Advanced French - Composition I**

Emphasis is placed on written command of French. Detailed study of syntax.

(Lecture/Tutorial)

*Prerequisite: FREN 206. Students with a grade of A- or above in FREN 202 may request permission of the Course Chair of FREN 301 to enrol directly in FREN 301 and - if accepted and if they so desire - to thereby register to challenge 206.*

**Argument:**

The new prerequisite statement still permits good students to jump Fren206 but helps us assure that only good students are given the benefit of doing so.
