Minor in Elementary School Physical Education

The Certificate in Literacy Instruction is designed to prepare individuals to teach the skills of literacy to adult learners. By combining courses from a number of different disciplines with opportunities for guided practice, the program will provide historical and contextual perspectives on literacy, acquaint students with current practices in the field and develop practical skills.

Program Requirements

Students must complete a total of 29 credit hours, of which 23 hours are earned by completing the following seven required courses.
