RE: Senate Appeals Board Annual Report for 2024

The Senate Appeals Board ("SAB") hears appeals from students on matters involving the application of academic policies and requirements relating but not limited to:

- withdrawal under extenuating circumstances ("WE")
- admission or re-admission to the University, where special circumstances are present

SAB normally meets once a month but will convene more frequently when necessary. In 2024, SAB met 11 times and reviewed a total of 59 student appeals.

In 2024, there were a total of 59 students who appealed for 68 terms. This is a slight increase over the past year. The number of cases has increased incrementally since 2021, whereas case numbers had been decreasing from 2017 to 2021. We will continue to monitor this trend. The large increase between 2021 to 2023 could be attributed to a larger proportion of students struggling with their academic studies and mental and physical health after the transition to in-person learning during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Also of particular note was one student who appealed for WEs for courses that were taken more than 5 years ago. SAB reviewed the documentation provided by the student and determined that the student provided relevant supporting documentation to support the WE request so it waived the five-year deadline. As such, SAB approved for the Manger, Student Academic Appeals to assume authority to adjudicate the appeal.

Students appealed on the following grounds:

The decision was made by someone without authority

A large number of students identified more than one ground for appeal. 51 of the 59 students who appealed submitted their appeal noting that they had new evidence for review.

Of the total 59 student appeals in 2024, 43 applied for WEs on medical grounds and 13 applied under compassionate grounds. SAB generally decides in favour of those applicants when there is sufficient evidence to demonstrate that instructors offered no accommodations, extensions, or deferrals on exams/assignments.

Procedure:

Each appeal is initially screened to determine whether it meets the grounds for appeal as outlined in the terms of reference. All appeals are heard in-camera (written form only). Students are provided with extensions to allow time to provide either more information or clearer documentation. In rare cases, if the SAB is unable to make a decision because of insufficient information, students may be asked to appear in person if they have indicated their willingness to do so on the application. The case then proceeds to an in-person hearing, at which time the student may present further evidence and answer questions. These hearings typically last 15 - 20 minutes.
