What is AIRP?

- Aging in Place (AIP) with the lens of "equity"
- The place an older person lives impacts their ability to age optimally and must match their unique lifestyles and vulnerabilities ^{1,2}



The 'right' set of housing, health, and social supports can enable older people to age in a positive way, including those with limited income and/or chronic complex health conditions. ^{1,2}

Older Persons Experiencing Homelessness (OPEH) in Metro Vancouver

- In Metro Vancouver, older people (age 55+) experiencing homelessness has ↑ 18%
 -22% in the last 10 years.
 - 2023 Metro Vancouver Homeless Count
- Community-based participatory research
 - It's time to include OPEH in research efforts to better meet their shelter/housing needs.





Objectives of the AIRP Project

To evaluate promising practices for the 'right' aspects of housing & supports for older persons with lived experience of homelessness (OPEH)


To identify concepts of AIRP important to OPEH in different types of housing

To facilitate knowledge mobilization and increase public awareness of OPEH and their housing options

To **improve the housing + support options** for OPEH to meet their unique and complex health and social needs



Promising Practices Across the Housing Continuum











Photovoice as Community Engaged Research Strategy



- Photovoice ^{6,7} used as a **community engaged research strategy** where participants document and reflect on the socio-spatial context of their life-stories.
- AIRP Project Exploration of the relationship between housing and aging for OPEH.

Agency
Facilitate equity

Photographs used to frame meaning and attachment to current housing situation

Promote critical dialogue and reflection on OPEH's journey towards AIRP

- * Participants (co-researchers) took photos that represent aging in the right place.
- To visually illustrate aspects of their lived experiences as they transition towards permanent housing.



Methods: Photovoice Interviews Temporary Housing Program (THP)

Photovoice: A community-engaged research strategy

Semi-structured interviews on life-course

Interviews focused on photographs

11 Clients

2-3 Sessions

45-to-60-minute sessions



- The Physical and Social Environment



"" I just think it is nice to have a gazebo. And it is nice to have a place for people to meet and chat. You know, there are seats all over — or all the way around. So, people can chat. Especially that people can't come together in the community room [because of the pandemic] It kind of became a place for people to hang out." VPP1-C3.



Aging in the right place... with the window there and the patio was also right beside there. So, you had the double whammy of having nice fresh air...we are fresh air people. ...It was just very nice to have that "...v1-P08



Where One Goes and What One Does

V1-P01



To show people, 'Hey, there is a bus stop, right? Near you. You don't have to walk very far.' That's why I took that photo. To say, well, if you're living at where I am right now you don't have that far to go, right? ...It means to me, 'Hey, I get to go somewhere [laughter].'



To get out of the home, out [in] the sun, that's it. Just get out [of] the house for a while... If you stay in the house all the time you get depressed, you need to get out. I need to get out to not be depressed.

How One Feels in "The Right Place"



It's lovely to be able to have your own space when you're cooking... It's the sense of independence of course, when you can supply your own meals cook your own food. For example, I made sauerkraut for the first time ...so you can have more control over your health and more control over your life and the sense of independence" V1-P05.



"...you just want to have a sense of safety, because... if you are scared every time, ... it really messes you up a little bit in your mind... so when you have that security there - you know the lighting, the key fobs, and just people around the area... I think that sense of security is so vital, especially for seniors..."
