Looking Ahead

Approvals that will bring exciting changes in 2022:

- The full program proposal for a new Interdisciplinary Undergraduate Minor in Public Policy was completed and approved, and is now before the Ministry for review.
- The Notice of Intent for a new undergraduate program in Urban Communities and Society was approved by Senate Committee on Undergraduate Studies (SCUS) and Senate Committee on University Priorities (SCUP).
- The Department of World Languages and Literatures standardized Spanish, Chinese, and German Studies certificates.
- The Department of Humanities received Senate approval for a name change to the Department of Global Humanities.
- English and World Languages and Literatures received approval for a Joint Major.

FASS 2021 Recruitment and Outreach

FASS recruitment and outreach went virtual due to the pandemic and continued to provide future and current students and their parents/supporters with the opportunity to "sample" what FASS has to offer. This included virtual graduate student lectures (FASS in the Class), information sessions, and FASS presentations.

In 2021, Arts Central shifted to more scheduled classroom presentations for high school students and saw a significant increase in the number of sessions booked and total attendees.

Many virtual sessions were recorded and can be viewed on the FASS e-Library. To date, we have 35 e-Library videos with over 10,000 combined views!

FASS in Surrey

FASS commissioned two reports from Dr. Noortje de Weers summarizing the current course offerings in Surrey. The reports also analysed how students who were part of the FASS One program were doing. Some of the results reveal:

- Participation in FASS One improves student CGPA in the first year
- FASS One students are considerably more likely to continue taking courses in Surrey after their first year
- Male students and those coming from areas geographically close to Surrey take a greater proportion of their courses at Surrey
- FASS One students are less likely to switch faculties compared to non-FASS One students
- Students who participate in FASS One are less likely to declare their major in the first year compared to non-FASS One students
- Being in a FASS One cohort significantly reduces the likelihood of ever being on academic probation, of needing to withdraw from SFU due to poor academic performance or of withdrawing from SFU voluntarily



Highlighting Black Histories

Beyond Black History Month, FASS hosts events throughout the year that span the disciplines, highlighting Black voices and experiences in the areas of history, art and culture, and contemporary politics.

FASS Advising Pilot

A partnership between FASS and Student Engagement & Retention (SER) started in September 2020 and has been extended to August 2022. Goals of the pilot:

- Create a sense of belonging by enhancing advisor-student connections
- Serve FASS admits as of Fall 2020 in more strategic and collaborative ways
- Shorten the wait time to connect with advisors, especially during peak times
- Support and empower students by walking them through basic "university language" and policies
- Reinforce teachings of University Prep by referring to modules and similar concepts
- Normalize group advising
- Clarify remote/online learning and explain asynchronous and synchronous teaching
- Take a proactive approach to support students by offering advising sessions to students earlier in the term

Economics Department Celebrates 55th Anniversary

The Department of Economics resumed its 55th anniversary campaign in 2021. Thank you to all faculty and staff who joined alumni and donors in enhancing student support throughout the campaign. Thanks to the generosity of our community, the department successfully launched the **Economics Student Leadership Fund** to support initiatives that create enriching educational experiences and transformative learning opportunities at SFU.
