







#### Recognizing Marianne Ignace

Marianne Ignace, is Director of the First Nations Language Centre and First Nations Languages Program, has been working to restore First Nations Languages for decades. In 2019, she received two major recognitions for her life's work which was conducted with the support of a 7-year \$2.5M SSHRC Partnership Grant to revitalize endangered languages. Coinvestigators from Western Canada partnered with two dozen grassroots First Nations groups representing 12 Indigenous languages in this important venture. The two awards are:

- SSHRC Award Impact Award for Partnership, recognizing her intellectual leadership and community co-operation, and the impact she has made beyond the social sciences research community.
- Governor General's Award for Innovation with her husband, Chief Ronald Ignace

#### **Recognitions and Research Awards**

**Tamir Moustafa,** International Studies, received a Lasting Contribution Award from the Law and Courts Section of the American Political Science Association in recognition of his first book *The Struggle for Constitutional Power: Law, Politics, and Economic Development in Egypt.* 

Two FASS faculty members were named among the eight SFU Distinguished Faculty Members in 2019:

- Laurel Weldon, Political Science. Weldon also received a Human Rights Book award for *The Logics of Gender Justice*.
- Lara Aknin, Psychology. Aknin also was a co-author of the UN's *World Happiness Report*.

The Centre for Imaginative Ethnography (CIE), a transnational independent research collective co-founded and co-curated by **Dara Culhane**, Sociology and Anthropology, received the prestigious American Anthropology Associate, General Anthropology Division's 2019 New Directions Group Award, in recognition of "work that presents anthropological perspectives to publics beyond the academy across diverse forms of media, with methodological rigor and ethical engagement."



The Times Higher Education World University Rankings placed SFU at 251-300 globally, 11th in Canada

Several subject areas in FASS exceeded the SFU global ranking:

- Social Sciences: 126-150th globally, 5th in Canada
- Arts and Humanities: 176-200 globally, 5th in Canada
- Economics and Business: 126-150 globally, 6th in Canada
- Psychology: 151-175 globally, 11th in Canada





#### First Nations Studies is Now Indigenous Studies

The renaming of First Nations Studies to **Indigenous Studies** was approved by Senate in January 2020.

President Andrew Petter commented at Senate: "One of the real joys in my term as President has been working to advance the work that First Nations Studies has challenged all of us to do — to better incorporate and recognize Indigenous knowledge, traditions and respect into our work. Thank you for leading us toward reconciliation."





#### **Creative Writing Awards**

In 2019, **David Chariandy**, English, and author of the critically acclaimed *Soucouyant* and *Brother*, won the Windham-Campbell Prize of \$165,000 USD.

**Stephen Collis** received the Latner Writers' Trust Poetry Prize of \$25,000. The prize honours a mid-career Canadian poet who has "mastered the art of poetry."



#### SSHRC Success for FASS Faculty

In 2019, 13 FASS faculty members received SSHRC Insight (IG) and Insight Development (IDG) grants. FASS applicants have a 65% success rate in the IG competition, compared to the national rate of 45%. This builds on our success rates in 2017 and 2018.

Psychology PhD student, received one of the 166 Vanier Canada Graduate Scholarships, valued at \$150,000.


Hanniball's proposed research aims to advance the theoretical construct of psychopathy in the assessment of psychopathic personality disorder.

They were the fifth SFU team since 2012 to win this annual case competition, involving 14 policy and public administration schools from across Canada.



#### Michael Thorburn Wins Schwarzman Scholarship

Michael Thorburn, Political Science alumnus, is one of 145 Schwarzman scholars. After graduating from SFU, Thorburn became the first black editor of the Osgoode Hall Law Journal. He says, "To this day, I still remember classes I took with Alex Moens, David Laycock and Andrew Heard."



#### 2020/21 Priorities for FASS

As SFU's largest Faculty, FASS is involved in a large number of projects and academic transitions. Some of our priorities for the next year:

- Undergraduate academic programming: Continue transition from CODE to C900 courses; further strengthen FASSONE at Surrey; consolidate unit repositioning by integrating Hellenic Studies into Humanities; transition SFUNOW from Lifelong Learning, while integrating online, blended, and non-traditional course delivery; develop Minor in First Nations Languages and joint Major in Indigenous Studies and History.
- Graduate Programs: Improve TA training; expand support for international TAs; finalize double MA in Applied Security and International Policy with University of Bath
- Endowment stewardship, including strategic planning for the Bill Reid Centre, Centre for Comparative Muslim Studies, and J.S. Woodsworth Chair in Humanities
