

SFU-EXETER ACCELERATED LAW

Is SFU-Exeter Accelerated Law for you?

Through this dual degree program, you will earn a Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree from SFU and a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree from the University of Exeter in the United Kingdom.

Traditional law school routes typically take at least seven years to finish, but often longer. In just six years, you can graduate from this program and be prepared to enter your legal profession—maximizing your earning potential—all without having to take the LSAT.

Start the first two years of your academic journey at SFU by choosing your major from one of 16 study areas in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. You will then move to England for three years before returning to Canada for your final year.

There are many exclusive benefits as part of this program. You will receive assistance preparing to move abroad, help navigating the UK's student visa application process, a guaranteed spot in university-run housing during your first year in the UK, 20% tuition discount at Exeter, as well as advising and professional support from both institutions throughout the duration of the program.

What you will learn

- General principles of ethics and professionalism in law: legal ethics; relevant legislation, regulations, rules of professional conduct, case law
- Administrative law including: delegation and consultation; procedural fairness; administrative tribunals
- Understanding of public law principles in Canada, including their inter-relationships with an application in relation to Indigenous peoples
- Practical experience through mooting, pro bono work, study tours, and work placements

The courses you will take during your final year of the program will help you pass the accreditation exams, and you will be qualified to practice law in Canada following the articling and bar admission process.

Develop a flexibility of mind that allows you to think about people's interactions in new ways and imagine alternate social possibilities.

Anthropology aims to communicate across boundaries of countries, histories, languages, cultures, social inequalities, and power differences. In an Anthropology course, you might be asked to think about Wall Street bankers in New York, mushroom foragers in China, or trans sex workers in Brazil.

As the study of humanity in all its diversity, Anthropology provides a global perspective that will enable you to understand the world as it is, while sparking your imagination with fresh ideas for how to change it.



Criminology is a fascinating interdisciplinary field that studies crime as an individual and social phenomenon. It examines how behaviour comes to be defined as criminal, why it happens, and explores how society and governments react to it.

We offer several exciting and dynamic undergraduate programs. Students can complete a major, a major with honours or a minor in Criminology, and minors in legal and police studies. We also offer diplomas and certificates in criminology, forensic, legal, police, and correctional studies.

Our program provides theoretical and practical coursework, allowing students to gain a broad education in all aspects of criminology, or focus on a specific area such as law, policing or corrections.

If you are curious about the complexities of criminal, delinquent and deviant behaviour and you seek to develop a critical and focused mind, then this program could be just what you are looking for.

Is Economics for you?

Why are some countries rich and some countries poor? How will rental restrictions affect the housing market? How can people make better decisions? These are the types of questions economists try to answer.

Economics is the study of how individuals, businesses, governments, and societies behave. It combines social science observation with a mathematical and statistical skill set that is in high demand from employers. In economics you will learn to think in a disciplined, rigorous way about the issues facing our world.

Economists use data analysis to answer questions in a wide range of settings, from business and finance to government to environmental problems like climate change.

You will gain an in-depth understanding of real-world phenomena such as inflation and unemployment numbers. Learn how people behave when they are facing constraints or scarcity, and how governments and businesses can account for this.

Your knowledge of trends can also help to predict the future.



Workers' rights and struggles are more important than ever and there are many careers that require a deep and critical understanding of employment, labour markets, and unions. In the Labour Studies Program at SFU, you will acquire this understanding and be empowered to tackle complex issues shaping the lives of workers and the future of work.

Is Linguistics for you?

Linguistics is the scientific study of language an important part of what makes us human. Have you ever wondered why language learning is so easy for infants, or how automatic translation and voice recognition work?

Our program introduces students to the systematic nature of language by exploring the patterns of sounds, words, sentences, and meanings in English and other languages.

Courses in linguistics explore the ways that language relates to how we socialize, how we understand or misunderstand one another, and how we interpret the world around us.

A Linguistics degree serves as a strong foundation for launching your career. We also offer a certificate in the Linguistics of Speech Science, which prepares you for graduate studies to become an audiologist or a speech therapist.

Our certificate in Teaching ESL Linguistics introduces foundational topics in English language instruction and classroom practices and includes a 30-hour practicum in ESL teaching for adults.

Studying philosophy allows you to consider some of the most fundamental questions we can pose about the nature of reality and the human condition: Who are we? How can I live a good life? Does God exist? What does justice require?

In philosophy you will confront the scope and limits of knowledge and learn to examine the processes and sources which produce it. You will examine how our moral values shape our social and political institutions, and whether they are rational.

Philosophy challenges you to engage with ideas rationally and systematically, and to approach reading and writing in a way that centers on clarity and rigor. These skills will be invaluable inside and outside the classroom, and will provide you with the necessary tools to become more thoughtful, reflective, and curious versions of yourself.

The program offers a specialized Philosophy and Law concentration, which is directly applicable to legal theory and policy courses, giving you a strong foundation for law school.

- Theoretical understanding of important ideologies from ancient philosophers
- Decision-making skills from application of formal methods used in philosophy, namely propositional and predicate logic
- Effective oral and written communication skills



Is Psychology for you?

Do you want to unlock the mysteries of the mind or learn to help others? If so, psychology might be for you. Psychology is the scientific study of behaviour, cognition, and emotions. We examine psychological issues at multiple levels of analysis, from the neuronal level to the societal context.

We are concerned with how people develop and change over time, how people manage relationships, how they treat each other, and how people communicate and behave. Much of the work we do is focused on understanding and improving people's mental, physical, and relational health.

Our program offers courses in history, quantitative and theoretical psychology, cognitive and neural science, developmental psychology, social psychology, law and forensic, and clinical science. We value research, and students can work closely with faculty on research projects.

Students can choose to pursue the concentration in applied behaviour analysis as part of their Psychology major, which provides practical skills for a career in supporting and treating individuals on the autism spectrum.

Core courses equip students with essential knowledge and skills to address diverse challenges within society, including those surrounding public health, labour, migration, housing, economic inequality, Indigenous policy, and climate change.

This interdisciplinary program integrates courses from different subject areas, allowing students to understand how public policy intersects with multiple disciplines.

The program's capstone course also offers an immersive, hands-on learning experience where students work in collaboration with government agencies to address actual policy issues.
