



FASS ONE IN SURREY

FASS One supports FASS first-year students at SFU's Surrey campus. In a cohort-like setting, you will receive assistance from a dedicated advisor and peer mentors for the first year of your academic journey. FASS One students have close contact with professors and staff, as well as the community at the Surrey campus. Additional benefits to enrolling in FASS One include reserved seats in courses, small classroom sizes, and regular engagement with the FASS Friends and Mentors (FaM).

MENTORSHIP

Arts Central is the home of the FASS Mentorship Program. Apply to be paired with a mentor and get help adjusting to university life. Mentors act as your personal guide and give you the inside scoop on quiet study spaces, fun clubs and activities, favourite professors, and the best food on campus. Mentorship is a peer-to-peer experience which can lead to long lasting friendships.

STUDENT UNIONS

Meet fellow students with similar academic interests and career goals. As a FASS student, you automatically belong to the Society for Arts and Social Sciences (SASS), as well as departmental student unions for any courses that you take. Members of student unions organize social, academic, and career-related events for students, represent the opinions of students in departmental meetings, and work together to better represent the needs and interests of students in their departments.

FINANCIAL AID

Help with the cost of university!

- » Scholarships (\$1,000 to \$11,000) recognize outstanding academic achievement.
- » Awards (\$1,000 to \$10,000) recognize exceptional accomplishments or contributions to the community.
- » Bursaries (\$500 to \$4,000) are a supplemental source of funding for students with demonstrated financial need.

Be sure to apply for entrance scholarships, open from October 1 through December 15.
