
Conference Digest

Following are a few points to bear in mind as we advance into May:





INSTRUCTIONS FOR PRESENTERS AND CHAIRS:

Presenters in regular panels should prepare talks of 20 minutes duration (plus discussion time). Where applicable we will supply a-v equipment and technical support, including computers and projection equipment. If you are intending to use PowerPoint software, you should plan to bring your file(s) on a flash drive/usb key (preferred) and/or cd/dvd. In mid-May we will be distributing information (including presenter contacts) and programming/formatting suggestions to all session chairs. If you are presenting in a panel session, please let me know if, for any reason, you do not wish your email address to be distributed to your session moderator.

AIRPORT SHUTTLE / SHARED RIDES:

By way of forward planning for visitors to Vancouver, the best means of transiting from the Vancouver International Airport to the city downtown are taxi or shuttle bus. The Vancouver Airporter shuttle is a reliable option, with several stops around the downtown area (@30-40 minutes travel time) and fares of \$13.50 CAN (one-way) and \$21.00 CAN (return). You might also wish to consider ride-sharing. Currently, Don Weitz (who arrives from Toronto via WestJet at 12:30 pm on Thursday, June 12th) is seeking a ride-share from another incoming traveller, or a lift from someone local. If you can assist, please let me know and I will put you in touch with Don.
