COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will explore the foundations of phonological theory with reference to a variety of languages. Topics to be covered include: levels of phonological representations, feature geometry, prosodic phonology, and approaches to representing phonological stress and tone. Extensive practice and analytical work with language data will contribute to the understanding of theoretical issues. The objective of the course is an understanding of the current state of phonological research, and the developing of skills for explaining phonological phenomena in a wide variety of languages through applying current phonological theories.
