

## **CA 890: Professional Practices Seminar I (Fall 2021)**

Course Description: This required non-credit course provides graduate students (MA, MFA, and PhD) working in contemporary arts with a supplementary focus on professional aspects of the discipline. Weekly meetings will be focused on pedagogy, research skills development, proposal and grant writing, academic writing, peer critique, artistic and career mentorship, community engagement, and presentations of works in progress. Panels and invited presentations by SCA faculty, staff, and professionals in the field will be a key feature of this course and its follow-up, CA 891, to be offered in the Spring term at the same time.

### Course Requirements:

#### 1. Regular attendance and active participation

- This may include, where relevant, discussion thread posts to the course Canvas site on assigned readings.

#### 2. Research presentation to School

- All incoming MA, MFA and PhD students will be required to make a short, Pecha Kucha-style presentation on their research to faculty, staff, and fellow students.
- These will take place monthly, preceding regular School meetings. Because of the size of each graduate cohort, these presentations will stretch across CA 890 and CA 891.

#### 3. Workshopping of paper or project proposal

- A mid-November workshop will be devoted to developing and refining student proposals for work-in-progress either directly connected or cognate to their degree requirements.
- Students can present for feedback proposals or project descriptions related to: final research papers in their coursework; a call for conference papers or journal/catalogue publications in their field; or a grant or presentation pitch (e.g., a revised SSHRC CGS-M research proposal for MA and MFA students or an early draft of a Spring Show proposal for MFA students).
